Notes

- 1 A visitor's shot gun permit is required for the possession, purchase or acquisition of a shot gun and should be produced when shot gun ammunition is purchased.
- 2 A shot gun is defined as:
a smooth bore gun (not being an airgun) which-
 - i) has a barrel length of not less than 60.96 cm (24 inches) and does not have any barrel with a bore exceeding 5.08 cm (two inches) in diameter;
 - ii) either has no magazine or has a non-detachable magazine incapable of holding more than two cartridges, and
 - iii) is not a revolver gun.
 Other smooth bore guns may require a visitor's firearm permit.
- 3 Any shot gun imported into or exported from Great Britain must be declared to HM Customs and Excise together with this permit at the time and place of import or export as the case may be. No such declaration need be made by permit holders where the shot gun is directly imported from, or exported to, another Member State of the European Union, although a Customs Officer may ask to see the permit.
- 4 The permit holder is requested to report the loss of this permit to the issuing police force at once.

- 5 Under section 32 of the Firearms (Amendment) Act 1997 where a person sells, lets on hire, lends for more than 72 hours or gives a shot gun to another person who is not a registered firearms dealer or a person who is entitled to purchase or acquire the shot gun without holding a certificate-
 - i) the person receiving the shot gun must produce the certificate or permit entitling him/ her to purchase or acquire the shot gun being transferred;
 - ii) the person selling, letting on hire, lending or giving the shot gun must comply with any instructions in the certificate or permit produced; and
 - iii) the final hand over of the shot gun must take place in person.
- 6 **If you:**
 - i) transfer a shot gun to anyone else including, lending it for more than 72 hours, selling it, hiring it out or making a gift of it; or
 - ii) deactivate a shot gun on this permit or have it deactivated by someone else; or
 - iii) destroy a shot gun, lose a shot gun or have a shot gun stolen
 the Firearms (Amendment) Act 1997 requires you to notify the chief officer of police who issued your permit within 7 days of the transaction by registered post or the recorded delivery service.
It is an offence for a person to fail to comply with these requirements.
